What is the census?

- The census happens every 10 years.
- The Government and other organisations need census data to make important decisions.



Census facts

- The first official Government census was in 1801.
- There was no census in 1941 because of World War II.
- The population of Scotland in 1801 was around 1.6 million. It's now about 5.4 million!
- Everyone in Scotland answers the same questions.

Scots Census facts

- In the 2011 census, 1.2 million people said that they could read, write and speak Scots
- Another 420,000 people said that they had some skills in Scots, for example some said that they could speak Scots but not read it.
- Just over 30% of people in Scotland can speak Scots.
- The Shetland Islands, Aberdeenshire, Moray and Orkney Islands had the highest proportions of Scots speakers at home.



This map shows the concentration of Scots speakers around the country.
