Shellycoat is written in the Scots language. Some of the words in the story are ones you will hear used everyday, like *canna* and *dinna*, or *ay* and *naw*. But there are some more unusual words too.

gowk - cuckoo (also used to mean 'fool or idiot'; in Scots an April Fool is an April Gowk)
mavis - a song thrush
reidshank - a redshank
sea-pyot - an oystercatcher
spoot - a razor clam
wulk - a whelk or periwinkle
